#### **Mayor of Biddeford**

I am thrilled at this opportunity to welcome you to Biddeford and the Maine Downtown Center Conference to celebrate Maine Downtown Center's 25th Anniversary. The theme this year is "Revitalization in Action," and that couldn't suit Biddeford better.

Over the last ten years Biddeford has experienced tremendous growth, including a wonderful

revitalization of our Main Street. Our downtown now boasts a boutique hotel, a vibrant art scene, new restaurants, and many thriving small businesses and stores. Our schools are celebrating twelve straight years of enrollment growth. We just cut the ribbon on a new school addition last week, and broke ground on another, to accommodate all the new students.

However, what you see here today was not always the case. Like many mill cities, when the factories closed and the workers left for other opportunities, activity in the downtown area slowed. Large retailers on the outskirts of town took away business, and a car-based lifestyle developed. But spurred by key investments by city leadership and partnerships with some very motivated citizen groups, most especially the Heart of Biddeford, our city has made a remarkable comeback.

I'm fond of saying that in Biddeford, community is a verb, as in, here in Biddeford, we community well. That's evident in our many events, including River Jam, Oktoberfest, Art Walk, and Winter Fest. We get together and build lasting bonds, and that helps lead to support for future initiatives. As a result, voters have consistently supported further investment in our downtown, and in our schools. Stated another way, where the Main Street organization goes, the investment will follow. When you arrived this morning, I hope you saw the light gleaming off the newly renovated clock and bell tower on City Hall, standing 6 stories high above Main Street. That golden dome is quite literally a shining example of the kinds of projects made possible through strong community partnerships. That didn't happen by accident. In 2017, our own Heart of Biddeford organization led the community to win a \$150,000 Partners in Preservation Grant to renovate the clock tower, with a theme called, "It's Our Time!". Just three years later, voters approved an additional \$3 million in funding for the remainder of the project, including refurbishing all of City Hall, and yes, re-gilding the dome.

And we've followed on with other initiatives. The City has placed 88 planters around downtown, with beautiful well-tended flowers all summer long. We built a 550-space parking garage using an innovative public-private financing partnership. The Biddeford City Theater has a full schedule of shows which often sell out, drawing hundreds of visitors downtown. The City Council has invested in new playgrounds in our parks. And although this is an area we need to do better, walking and biking trails are fairly easily accessible from the downtown area, as well.

Even though we have more to do, it's nice to look back; and we are very proud of all that has been accomplished. I'm especially pleased that one of our newest downtown businesses, Rhona Beauty, has won the MDC 2024 Downtown Small Business Award (my recommendation: book an appointment today for a shampoo and a chair massage – you'll be glad you did).

In closing, thank you for visiting beautiful downtown Biddeford. I look forward to meeting you at the conference, and I am so excited to see where we go from here. We find success when we community well.






Lunch Site

## 2024 Downtown Project of the Year

#### The Uptown - Bath, Maine

The Uptown, a 60-unit residential development, including 42 units that have affordable rents, is the redevelopment of two existing buildings along with the construction of new housing on an adjacent infill vacant lot. The project rehabilitated two historic properties, which had existing residential and commercial space, and the addition of loft-style apartments and communal space.

The Uptown project builds density in Downtown Bath, recreates underutilized space and provides attainable housing for older residents, all the while honoring goals set out in our newly completed comprehensive plan. Project partners sought to facilitate the preservation of the character of downtown Bath, encourage economic stimulus in the walkable central core and maintain rental housing at modest prices for those who live and work in Bath.

#### Rhona Beauty - Biddeford, Maine

In 2022, he became the Town Manager, a position in which he continues to serve the citizens of Van Buren. Several upcoming projects include a \$1.8 million community tech hub and the renovation of the former Van Buren Municpal Building into a
